Principal's Message (Ms. Lorna Anderson)

We pride ourselves on developing strong relationships within our school community. For example, at our weekly assemblies, our students and staff sing "We're a Family After All" together. Following the pandemic, we recognize that connecting became a challenge. With our school council identifying improved connection as a goal, we have worked to bring families back into the school by having monthly family lunch days, face to face parent teacher interviews and student-led conferences accompanied by book fairs, classroom volunteers, and in person fundraising and school council meetings. We have held events to engage families in the school such as Welcome Fair in the fall, soccer fun afternoon, a Remembrance Day ceremony in November, and a standing room only Christmas concert. Additionally, with the support of the school council and a partnership with Family Community Support Services, we offered a free family workshop on childhood anxiety and how caregivers can support their children. This has blossomed into identifying another focus topic of digital literacy. Our connections are gaining strength.

Whispering Hills Primary School, which is located in Athabasca, is a dual-track English and French Immersion school for kindergarten through grade 3 students. We also offer a preschool program for 3 and 4 year olds named WHPS Great Beginnings. Serving our student population of 365 students are fourteen teachers, one school counselor, one inclusive education lead, twenty one support staff, and an administrative team consisting of a principal and vice principal. This dedicated team of individuals pride themselves on developing strong relationships, working collaboratively with families, and creating an inclusive and engaging learning environment to ensure an optimal learning experience for all students.
